SECREST, WASHINGTON H. -- In the headright Certificate issued to him in 1838 by the Colorado County Board of Land Commissioners for one league and one labor of land it is stated that he came to Texas prior to May 2, 1835. This was lost and a duplicate was issued in conformity with an Act of Congress approved January 16, 1850. He came to Texas in 1835 with his brother Fielding Secrest.

Mr. Secrest was a spy in Captain Henry W. Karnes' Cavalry Company and was issued Bounty Certificate No. 9827 for 640 acres of land for his services from Mafch 12 to September 22, 1836. On November 9, 1838 he received Donation Certificate No. 590 for 640 acres of land for having participated in the Battle of San Jacinto. On June 25, 1836 he was appointed captain of the Washington Cavalry.

After statehood, Captain Secrest became a State Ranger. The Telegraph, Houston, August 29, 1851, reports the arrival of Mr. Secrest in town after a trip to Eagle Pass. His home at that time was in Washington County. He died in 1854. Mrs. Dilue Harris in her reminiscences printed in the Texas Historical Assocation Quarterly, Vol. 4 p. 175 said that he died at Columbus, Colorado County in 1859, but she was mistaken about the time of his death. His estate was probated in Colorado County February 28, 1854 (Book D, page 211). He left the following minor children: F. E. C., Elizabeth, C. George, Jacob W., and T. A. U. Secrest.
