

ROBBINS, JOHN - On page 6 of Wavell's Register, Spanish Archives in the General Land Office it is shown that when Mr. Robbins took oath November 24, 1830 he stated that he was thirty-five years of age and that his wife, Cinthiana Humfrey, was twenty-six. He said that he had two children, Rebecca, aged five and Lucinda, aged three. He stated that he had arrived in Texas from Arkansas, August 17, 1817. In Headright Certificate No. 319 issued to him March 29, 1838 for a league and labor of land by the Board of Land Commissioners for Montgomery County it is stated that he came to Texas in 1819.

In Comptroller's Military Service Record No. 1580 it is certified that Mr. Robbins had served in the army from April 6 to September 4, 1836 and was a member of Captain William H. Smith's cavalry company at San Jacinto where he lost his horse, bridle and saddle during the engagement. He did not apply for the bounty land due him. On February 18, 1854 Donation Certificate No. 552 for 640 acres of land was issued in Mr. Robbin's name, due him for having participated in the Battle of San Jacinto.

The first Mrs. Robbins evidently died before October 12, 1837 for the marriage records of Washington County show that Mr. Robbins was married to Eliza Crane, October 12, 1837. Mr. and Mrs. Robbins died in what is now Leon County Prior to the year 1847.
