MUHRAY, WILLIAM -- The compiler does not know when Mr. Murray came to Texas since he did not apply for a headright certificate.

In Comptroller's Military Service Record No. 615 it is stated that Mr. Murray enlisted in Captain James Smith's Cavalry Company April 11, 1836 and served in Captain Robert J. Calder's Brazoria Company at San Jacinto. On August 2, 1838 he was issued Bounty Certificate No. 4169 for 320 acres of land for having served in the army from April 11 to July 12, 1836. He did not apply for the 640 acres of donation land due him for having participated in the battle.

On the back of Bounty Certificate No. 4169 it is transferred March 10, 1855 by Mr. Murray to Hugh Young. Mr. Murray could not sign his name, affixing his mark to the transfer. His address was not shown.

Wiley Thornton Murray and Harriet Agnes Murray (Mrs. George Badger Cooke), my great-grandmother, had a brother William Thomas Murray but I have no other information about him. Their parents were Richard Ivy Murray and Agnes Moore Murray of Fayette, Alabama. There is a Tom Murray who is the son of Wiley Thornton Murray living in San Saba, Texas, and perhaps he can tell you. Or some of my great-aunts whose addresses I have given you in the "Cooke" report might know.

I have learned since writing this note that the only Murray left in San Saba is a grand-daughter of Wiley Thornton Murray. Her name is Mrs. Clay Kuykendall, and San Saba, Texas is all of the addression needed. I would love to know if you get any information.
